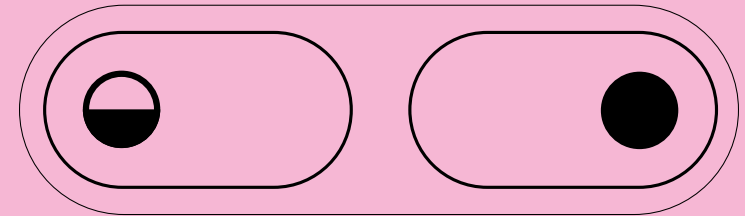
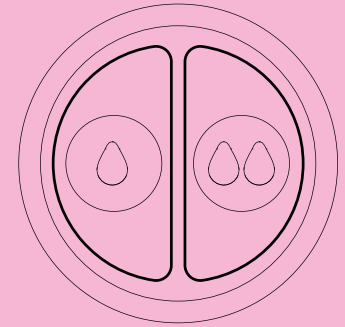
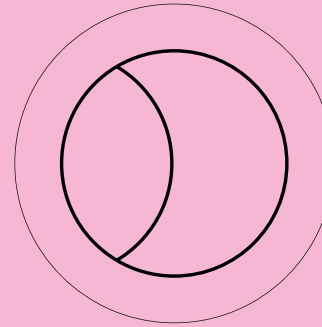
My consistent after-work, once-a-week running route during the Daylight Savings Time months of summer.
